...from the Pastor's Pen...

Dear Friends,

Suuummmertime......and the livin' is easy.....right? Just thinking about what's going on in our country and valley and community, and thinking, too, about some of the hard times we've shared this summer with losses of loved ones. Yet I am also remembering the other side of the circle of life, with births and plantings and growth popping out all over the hills and fields.

Can't see them most of the time, but I'm told of new baby goats and sheep living just up the road, and the Shirleys celebrating the birth of a granddaughter after a wonderful team of boys. Then there are the strawberries, beautiful this year in June, and the corn coming on, and our cows...you know I love our cows...just check the window sill next to my desk. I can't wait for the New York State Fair when I walk through the main gate, turn right, and hoof my way to the Cow Barn, my favorite of favorites. I admit it – I spend several hours there each year, talking with farm hands and admiring their livestock.

Sometimes I need just to kick back and take stock of my blessings, especially in these days of conflict and worry all around the world as countries and leaders try to dominate one another in matters of culture, religion, and life practices and choices of all kinds. I cherish my faith at times like this, because I know that even in the midst of terror, fright, and oppositional politics, God is still working, and I – we – are part of God's plan for peace. All that we do with that aim in mind contributes to the building of a world-wide civilization in which each one of earth's people can claim a place of safety and plenty.

My memory returns often to the iftar dinner I experienced with a group of Interfaith women in June, during the Muslim period of Ramadan. "Iftar" means "breaking the fast," and there, I witnessed gracious and welcoming fellowship as they served typical Middle Eastern

food and ate, talked, and laughed with us as we shared details of our lives. I hope to go again next year, and if you would like to go, too, please let me know.

The iftar is served at dusk, and the faithful are hungry and thirsty by the time they can finally eat on those days. Breakfast is taken before dawn, about 4 am, and of course we guests asked how the women managed during those sixteen hour days without food or water. They answered, "We are used to it," although exceptions are made for children, the elderly, pregnant, and the ill, which still leaves a lot of people "in the same boat."

But when the time of fast is over, all people gather to celebrate, so the iftar meal at dusk is festive and delicious, often with small gifts given to children.

Fasting is a spiritual ritual practiced in many world religions, including Christianity, and it is the spiritual element of the experience that gives it meaning. The women at the iftar dinner conveyed ease and acceptance as they explained their ritual, and each of them expressed feeling that their faith is strengthened through their Ramadan practices.

This special experience made me think about our own rituals, and, of course, Holy Communion, central to our expression of belief in Jesus and his mission. We participate in our rituals and may take them for granted, especially when we fold them into our ordinary lives without much thought or discomfort.

Giving up food and drink for sixteen hours a day over an Islamic month (30 or 31 days like our Gregorian calendar) is no small feat, but it expresses the purpose of Ramadan: to identify with those less fortunate than themselves by feeding the hungry and refraining from food, gossip, fighting, and other specified behaviors during daylight hours. It is a conscious and <u>strenuous</u> practice of a Muslim's faith principles.

What did I learn from the experience? To be much more intentional and strenuous about my own faith practice, including, but not limited to, prayer, communion, Bible study, and charity.

What are your faith practices, and how can they become more meaningful and life-giving for you? It's worth considering as we seek to grow in our love for God and one another.

Savior, by Matt Laney July 14, 2017

"For today in the city of David there has been born for you a savior, who is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:11

This "savior" stuff doesn't come naturally to our contemporary, self-reliant, "can-do" culture. We're all for healing the world but less inclined to admit we also need a healer.

We can identify racism, sexism, and xenophobia in our culture and be slow to admit the need to exorcise those demons from ourselves.

Meanwhile, we know dentists cannot put filling in their own teeth, a hairstylist cannot adequately do his own hair, and a surgeon cannot operate on herself. We cannot baptize ourselves or serve ourselves communion, but we still struggle to admit we can only be restored by surrendering to a Presence larger and wiser than ourselves.

I understand the reluctance. Part of me would rather not believe I can improve myself through my own efforts: a spiritual tweak here, a moral upgrade there, instead of admitting I need a total overhaul of heart and mind.

Here's why: if I am healed by my own efforts, there would be limits to what God could ask of me. But if I am healed by the grace of God in Christ, then I belong to Christ and I owe God everything. That's scary until we realize there is nothing more liberating than giving everything to God and nothing more terrifying than being left to our own devices.

Giving up control is frightening until we acknowledge we have never been in control for a day in our lives. Life begins when we turn to our Savior, one day, one moment, at a time.

Prayer: Help me, Savior God, and just for you today, let me surrender everything to you.

What can we do this summer for our kids? We considered Vacation Bible School, but for a variety of reasons, it hasn't come together. So, we brainstormed some ideas for one-time fun times for the kids, their parents, and any other members and friends who might like to join the adventure.

Some ideas include going to a Chiefs' game; getting together for miniature golf, a picnic, and ice cream; sharing an ice cream social on the lawn (maybe we will do this when we dedicate the new porch); visiting various religious houses of worship; making and providing sandwich lunches for the Oxford Inn or other local charities; and other ideas.

Do you have suggestions? Would you I ike to help in some w ay (both parents and friends!)? Some of the CE committee members are gathering detail about these various possibilities, and we will let you know the plans!

For many years, a Chautauqua has met on the Homer Green and area churches for a week during the summer. Started in 1992, it was modeled after the summer programs held at Lake Chautauqua in Western New York. Classes are of general interest for all ages and run across a wide range of topics.
