Have you ever sat back and thought about how blessed we really are?

We all have things that we have concerns about. At the time they may seem almost impossible to handle, but are they really? Do we take time to think about how lucky we are? Have we ever had to wonder where our next meal was coming from or where we would sleep that night? I am sure most of us have never been in that situation. Our church is very dedicated to maintaining the Preble Community Food Pantry to help people supplement their groceries each month. Are there other ways that we might reach out to help?

In April Renee Gates, Lou Scott and I attended a meeting held at Homer Congregational Church which dealt with the homeless in Cortland County. It was definitely an eye opener for us. We knew there were homeless people out there, but I certainly did not know the extent of it right in our own backyard. It is not just a big city problem. There were representatives there from several agencies explaining the situation in the Cortland area. These agencies are working to help the situation but there are more homeless people than accommodations for them. Loaves and Fishes and food pantries help with some meals. According to a recent Cortland Standard article nearly 13 % (6,000) are food insecure in Cortland County. There are two locations available for showers and doing laundry for the homeless. The Cortland Library has opened its doors during the day to provide a warm place during the winter months, use of computers and charging stations for cell phones. These agencies explained that there just are not enough available spots for these people to sleep. They are also limited in what they can find in other services to help them to "get back on their feet". This was a very eye-opening experience for all attending the meeting. We all left the meeting wondering how we might help in some way. Just something for you to think about!

Our Mission for the Month of June
