...from the Pastor's Pen...

Dear Friends,

Truly, in my lifetime and through all of the elections I've voted in, I do not recall a national presidential campaign so troubling and ugly. I wish I could say it will be over on November 9th, once all the votes have been counted and a winner declared. I wish I could look forward to some peace and cooperation across the aisle between our two major parties.

Most of all, I wish the political leaders of America had learned something from this angry campaign – learned that the citizens of our country are tired of politics-as-usual and Washington gridlock, and would become willing to respond equitably to our concerns, but I fear it is not to be. Both parties are lining up for more conflict following the election, never mind who is elected. I hope the election isn't close, because I don't want to see pricey challenges and legal adjudications that cost taxpayers more money in support such bipartisan confrontation. I'm tired of all the conflict.



I will vote and I hope you and all your neighbors, friends, and relatives will, too. Our votes count and our situation is *not* hopeless. The tiresome and startling revelations in the lives of the major nominees may shock us – revelations about values, habits, finances, behaviors – and the words the nominees use against each other – these things name the sinful condition of humanity, to tell the truth, and when they are exposed like they have been, we are embarrassed and angry.

These are the sorts of things usually kept under wraps, but not now, not in this election cycle. So we are faced with two major candidates who carry the highest individual negative ratings in recent history, and as we choose our candidate, we seem forced to take sides against one another, too.

These days are too much with us. In the interest of self-care, I've taken to listening to a classical music station in my car rather than my relatively-objective NPR radio station. And I

cleave to an over-riding axiom that I know to be true: God's kingdom and presence is not up for a popular vote. The Kingdom of God is not dualistic, meaning that people are included, not excluded, for their beliefs, skin color, religion, cultures, practices. Further, all of those people – and they are us – are forgiven and living in a state of grace even when they don't know it, so it's not as if these marginalized persons will be able to achieve "entry" once they conform to someone's certain ideas of belonging.

This is grace in its most amazing form, a grace that embraces all people, already, and it is good news for everybody, if we could and would honor this reality. We are not "us versus them," or "in versus out," or "my side is better than your side." These are playground games that hopefully we outgrow as we mature spiritually.

And what does it mean to mature spiritually? Of course, that is the question. We are good people, by and large, and the world is a very complicated place. We want to be safe and to keep our families fed, sheltered, and safe, but many things are out of our control in regard to our hopes and goals. Immediate events and threats may cause us to become defensive or to expect others to defend us, including our government bodies. This is a very real part of our world.

But the other, much more important part to remember in the face of such threat, is that we are called to Christian values such as to "love God and to love one another," and that "all things work together for good for those who love God." Just as Jesus blessed those people who were declared unfit by temple authorities, so we are called to that higher standard: to embrace those who are different from us, for the simple reason that God loves all people.

This means we are to seek ways to live together in harmony rather than rejection and conflict.

Election Day is coming on November 8th, and we will know the outcome on November 9th. We face more conflict after the election, 'tis true, as the various people and parties continue to promote their separate visions of truth. Instead, how about trying to learn how to – dare I say it? – compromise with one another.



But for God's people, we face no uncertainly. The vote was in even before time began. God said, "I will be your God, and you will be my people." No barriers, no divisions, no conflict. Simple, all-embracing love and harmony for all.

The Kids' Christmas Pageant on December 19th will be followed by a visit from Santa and Snowflake during fellowship time following the service, and Christmas goodies will be enjoyed by all.

Concert in Our Sanctuary

On Tuesday, January 3, 2017, the Preble Congregational Church will host a concert of early music by four unique, professional musicians.

Violists Alex Korolov, Alex Rakov, and Tom Klenck, with harpsichordist Alan Giambattista will perform music by Marin Marais (1656-1728), Jean de Sainte-Colombe (1640-1700), Jean-Philippe Rameau (1683-1764) and J. S. Bach (1685-1750).



These accomplished performers (in collaboration with soprano Marion Giambattista) presented a similar event two years ago in the same venue and were received with rave reviews from the many

visitors who came to the concert.

The church doors will open at 6:30 p.m., with the concert scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. There is no admission fee for this one-of-a-kind performance, but donations will be gratefully accepted.

Light refreshments will be served following the performance, at which time the performers will be happy to explain any aspects of the music and to give anyone interested a closer look at their instruments.

Preble Church Mission Work

Many thanks to Annette Benson for presenting the Mission Moment each Sunday during worship. Our church gives to many ministries; here are some of them.

OCWM, or Our Church's Wider Mission, distributes local church contributions to support various mission works around the globe. The amount each church gives is based upon the number of its

members or upon the amount the church is able to offer. Our donation for 2016 was \$1700.

Special offerings during each church year help to support other ministries, as well, and if a church gives to all of them, it becomes a "5 for 5 Congregation." Our church achieved that designation in 2016 by contributing to OCWM, Neighbors in Need, One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Fund, and Strengthen the Church. The <u>Community Food Pantry</u> opens on the third Thursday of each month. People shop from the shelves in the church foyer and also receive a special bag filled with paper products not available through other food pantries. Our Pantry is independent, which means we don't require proof of need before people are allowed to participate.

The Heifer Project this year involved collecting for trios of rabbits to be given to families in needy areas of the world. We raised \$363 and each trio costs \$60, so we are sending six sets of rabbits!

School bag kits are assembled in March for April pick up each year, but we collect items for the bags throughout the year. Annette lets us know what to donate each month, while Mimi Cornue and Sue Swayze make the bags for this ministry.



We also contribute to <u>other needs</u> during the year, as they are presented. Annette plans ahead for every month of the year, so we will continue to see how we can help others.

Thank you to this wonderful congregation for your contributions to the work of God's church within and outside the sanctuary doors!

<u>Neighbors in Need (NIN)</u>

For several weeks during October and November, we will collect donations for one of the UCC 5-for-5 Missions: Neighbors in Need.

NIN supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Twothirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.

One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries. Today there are twenty UCC congregations on reservati ons and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis supported by this fund.

Cheering for Jesus! Richard L. Floyd, October 4, 2016

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." - Hebrews 13:8

My friend John, an ophthalmologist and former congregant of mine, led several dozen trips to Ecuador on "eye missions."

I went with him on a couple of them. Our team worked together with area churches, and one day he introduced me to a local pastor, who immediately invited me to preach at their Sunday evening service.

But that Sunday afternoon we had torrential rains that filled the streets with over a foot of water. I said to one of their church members, "I suppose the evening service will be cancelled?"

"Oh no, they'll be there!"

And they were. The church was packed. We waded to get there.

My Spanish is pretty much limited to eye testing: "Otro oho!" So I employed our translator, Ira, to follow me line by line as I preached.

I started out with our differences: "I live in North America, and you live in South America." "My congregation is very old and yours is very young." And so forth.

Finally I said: "But despite our many differences we have something very important in common. We share faith in Jesus Christ, who is 'the same yesterday and today and forever!"

As I had been speaking, and Ira had been translating, they had been attentive and polite, but now the whole congregation rose to their feet and started clapping and cheering, and it went on for some time.

I was overcome with emotion, because I knew they weren't cheering for me, and they weren't cheering for Ira.

No, they were cheering for Jesus!
