...from the Pastor's Pen...

Dear Friends,



<u>Thank you, kind church</u>, for your care and hospitality to me in these weeks following knee surgery. I've witnessed the church in action often, helping others with food and deed, and now I have received these blessings from you; they were so welcome and appreciated.

In Acts 20:35, Paul reminds us that Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." When we give in different ways to others, we build relationships with them, which is the focus of Jesus' admonition.

But I want to acknowledge that there is something special about receiving, too, and for many, that's the more difficult place to be. When we admit a need, we become vulnerable and must rely on others to help us...which means we aren't able at that moment to take care of ourselves. In our independent society, being needy feels weak to many people when it means we have to rely on others for assistance. And sometimes, those we ask to help us aren't so eager to do it, which makes both people feel badly. The spirit of giving is as important as the deed.

But blessings flow both ways when we help one another, and they always come back around, too. When we give of our time or resources to another, we almost always feel good about it – we've all had that experience – but when we *receive* graciously, we allow others to share in the blessing that Paul expressed through the words of Jesus.

On another note, the Pioneer this month amounts just to this letter, as time's a'passin'! October is our Harvest of Faith month, when we offer our contributions to this major fundraiser for our 2017 operating budget. We've mentioned the date during worship announcements on Sundays, and last Sunday favors were

distributed in church for your doorknobs.
