
On July 25, 1999, at Woodstock 99 on the East Stage in Rome, NY, Elvis Costello sang these words, which still seem appropriate for today:

The lectionary reading for August 20 from Matthew 15 focused on Jesus' talk with the disciples about those Pharisees who complained about how the disciples failed to comply with rules and regulations that told them how to worship God and live according to the Law.

But Jesus came right back at the Pharisees and quoted Isaiah's prophecy (29:13) about *people who make a big show of saying the right things, but their heart isn't in it. They act like they worship God, but they just use God as a cover for teaching whatever suits their fancy.*

I believe that we try very hard to rely upon God's word with honesty.

The question Elvis Costello asked in 1999 is still relevant today as we confront the shock, confusion, and tragedy unfolding in so many venues in our country and world. It's at times like these when we must remember the words of Jesus and let them guide us: *What contaminates someone in God's sight is what comes out of the heart (when it is) evil thoughts and arguments, murder, lies, insults...It is the stuff of the heart that counts in God's sight."*

Nothing for us as Christians has changed because of the frightening events of today's environment. God still works constantly in the world. God is Still Speaking, and Jesus' words still reign in our hearts, guiding us in our response to the hatred expressed around us. What is in the heart of those who follow the Way? Love, acceptance, the willingness to compromise, the desire to create a win-win for all, and the determination to hear and act upon the healthy, hopeful, and promising words that come from not only our own hearts but from the hearts of other people.

May we, as members and friends of this little country church, speak to and hear each other in ways that reveal our discipleship, and may we act upon those impulses of our hearts. In that way, we will be instruments for peace, love, and understanding among all people.

500th Anniversary of the
Protestant Reformation

2017 is a huge year for the Protestant
Reformation!

All of Germany and Lutherans world-wide have been preparing for an influx of thousands of tourists and visitors who want to see where Martin Luther lived, loved, labored, and changed the face of the Christian faith.

In 2013, I visited Germany on a “Lutherland” trip with other New York Conference travelers, sponsored by our Evangelical Kirche (Church) partners. The trip led to a much greater understanding of what Luther’s thoughts and actions meant to our way of faith.

Germany’s churches and other places connected to Luther are national treasures, supported in large part by the government. By 2013, efforts were well underway to spruce up and maintain these structures to prepare for the anniversary year, at a cost of millions of Euros.

But the astronomical cost is well worth it – the structures and places are important to world heritage, and incredibly beautiful.

Our church has purchased fifteen books, newly-published, about the Reformation, written in a series of chapters by the UCC Writers Group. There are four sections with 2 or 3 sections each. I will be using some of the material during worship on upcoming Sundays. (See next column.)

If you would like one of the books, or want to study the book with others, please let me know. It’s well worth our time to grow our understanding of the events that led up to the Protestant Reformation.
